

Donna Murch is associate professor of history at Rutgers University. She is currently completing a new trade press book entitled *Crack in Los Angeles: Policing the Crisis and the War on Drugs*. She also has a forthcoming book of essays that will be published later this year entitled, *Assata Taught Me: State Violence, Mass Incarceration and the Movement for Black Lives*. In October 2010, Murch published the award-winning monograph *Living for the City: Migration, Education and the Rise of the Black Panther Party in Oakland, California* with the University of North Carolina Press, which won the Phillis Wheatley prize in December 2011. She has written for the *Sunday Washington Post*, *New Republic*, *Nation*, *Boston Review*, *The Chronicle for Higher Education*, *Black Scholar*, and the *Journal of American History* as well as appearing in Stanley Nelson's documentary, *Black Panthers: Vanguard of the Revolution*.
